

**ESTABLISHED OCTOBER 31, 1783 TO TAKE EFFECT JUNE 2, 1784 AS
SUBSEQUENTLY AMENDED AND IN FORCE DECEMBER 1990**

BILL OF RIGHTS

[Art.] 2-a. [The Bearing of Arms.] All persons have the right to keep and bear arms in defense of themselves, their families, their property and the state. *December 1, 1982* (GBs note: I brought a tape recorder and a firearm to the meeting. I used the tape recorder.)

[Art.] 10. [Right of Revolution.] Government being instituted for the common benefit, protection, and security, of the whole community, and not for the private interest or emolument of any one man, family, or class of men; therefore, whenever the ends of government are perverted, and public liberty manifestly endangered, and all other means of redress are ineffectual, the people may, and of right ought to reform the old, or establish a new government. The doctrine of nonresistance against arbitrary power, and oppression, is absurd, slavish, and destructive of the good and happiness of mankind. (GBs note: Since those threatening to kill me are politicians and law enforcement officers I had the right, the duty and obligation to resist.)

[Art.] 22. [Free Speech; Liberty of the Press.] Free speech and liberty of the press are essential to the security of freedom in a state: They ought, therefore, to be inviolably preserved. (GBs note: These politicians and law enforcement officers are threatening to kill me because I was successfully filing petitions against them exposing their crimes.)

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 30. [Freedom of Speech.] The freedom of deliberation, speech, and debate, in either house of the legislature, is so essential to the rights of the people, that it cannot be the foundation of any action, complaint, or prosecution, in any other court or place whatsoever. (GBs note: These politicians and law enforcement officers are threatening to kill me because I was speaking freely and reporting their crimes.)
